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The egg is one of the most widely eaten foods around the world, and can be prepared in a manner of different ways. Perhaps most commonly associated with breakfast, we'll enjoy the following egg dishes at any time or day of the week.

Shakshouka

Of disputed origin, shakshouka is most commonly known as a Maghrebi dish of eggs poached in a delicious sauce of tomatoes, olive oil, peppers, onion and garlic. The dish is also commonly spiced with cumin, paprika, cayenne pepper, and nutmeg. Preserved lemon, sheep milk cheese, olives, harissa, or a sausage such as chorizo or merguez is also commonly added, while a variation of the dish in Andalusia will see jamon added to become what is known as 'huevos a la flamenca'.

Egg drop soup

Synonymous with Chinese diaspora, egg drop soup contains wispy, beaten eggs in a chicken broth. But to pass the dish off as this simple does not accurately convey its tastiness. Condiments such as pepper scallions, and tofu are common additions to this dish, which draws its name from the addition of a thin stream of beaten eggs to the boiling broth in the final moments of its preparation. This creates thin, silken strands, or flakes of cooked egg that float to the top.

Spanish omelette

A signature dish in Spanish cuisine, the Spanish omelette, or Spanish tortilla, is a chart-topping tapa, but who would blame you for craving it as an appetiser or main course? The most popular variant on the Spanish omelette sees onion included, although regional differences often result in a thicker (tortiella de pataques), less-fried (tortilla de patatas), or a softer, runnier version (tortilla de Betanzos).

Huevos rancheros

Born on rural Mexican farms, huevos rancheros, or "eggs ranch-style", is a breakfast dish consisting of eggs served in the style of the traditional, mid-morning fare found in the country's haciendas. The dish consists of fried eggs served on lightly charred tortillas, topped with a salsa fresca made of tomatoes, chili peppers, onion, and coriander. The meal truly shines with its range of accompaniments, including refried beans, Mexican-style rice, guacamole, and slices of avocado, with coriander as a garnish.

flying the route following the withdrawal of Virgin Australia, with Rex set to fill VA's boots to the country's largest inland city.

"We are delighted to be working closely with the airline and Canberra Airport through Visit Canberra to widely promote the new services and contribute to the growth of the route," Barr said.

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


Solar Egg in Sweden

We all imagine the inside of eggs to be a warm and comfortable place and there is perhaps no better example of this than the Solar Egg located in Sweden's Luossabacken ski resort. This impressive golden egg designed by local art duo Bigert & Bergström houses a four-metre-wide sauna that can accommodate up to eight people at a steamy 75° Celsius temperature. Besides warming the cockles of thankful skiers, the Solar Egg is also viewed as an important public sculpture symbolising the rebirth of its host town Kiruna, which has been forced in recent years to relocate parts of its city centre because of land damage caused by iron ore mining. To our knowledge however, there is no accompanying goose monument depicting how this golden egg was laid.

The Eggs of Merry Bay in Iceland

Iceland is a country rich in biodiversity and the people here are always proud to promote this virtue to tourists. This pride is on full display at The Eggs of Merry Bay, an impressive line of 34 giant eggs that represent a tribute to the species of native birds that inhabit the country's east. Located near the town of Djupivogur, the walk along the coast has become a very popular tourism draw, with each individual egg accurately constructed to show the authentic shapes, patterns and colours of each egg species. Designed by local artist Sigurdour Gudmundsson in 2009, the eggs are all approximately the same size except for one, the egg of the red-throated diver which has a larger egg to denote its status as the official bird of Djupivogur.





Dali Theatre and Museum in Spain

The famous surrealist artist Salvador Dali has all of his bizarre and creative acumen on display at the Dali Theatre and Museum in the Spanish town of Figueres, but perhaps most striking is the collection of giant eggs that adorn the parapets of the museum's facade. The building houses the largest collection of Dali's work in the world, with the egg a recurring theme in the eccentric artist's paintings, along with melting clocks and watches of course, representing the concept of renewal, continuation, and the future. One of his best-known paintings featuring an egg is 'Eggs on a Plate without the Plate', featuring a watch hanging beneath an ear of corn and beside a plate fried of eggs, with a third egg hovering above, suspended by a string – sounds a bit like a hipster's breakfast to us really.

Riverside Roundabout in Los Angeles

Keep your eyes on the road please driver! It's perhaps a little distracting to approach a roundabout and be confronted with an array of egg-shaped granite faces, but that's just what visitors will see in Los Angeles at the intersection of Riverside Drive and San Fernando Road in Cypress Park. Nine giant faces have been meticulously carved into giant egg borders, all depicting the mugs of actual local people who were randomly selected from a

ballot to be emblazoned in rock forever. The installations are designed to reflect the local community spirit and natural flora. Too bad if you had a bad hair day or pimple on the day of posing, that image is permanently in stone my friend.

World's Largest Czech Egg in Kansas

Traditional Czech flair is on full display in Wilson, Kansas, with a giant sixmetre-tall egg painted in honour of the Czech Republic's famous eggs

captivating hordes of visitors every year. There are plenty of Czechoslovakian expats in this neck of the woods, part of the reason for the homage, with the community of Wilson also famous for hosting an annual event in July to commemorate the central European country's wide range of arts, culture and food. For tourists, the location of the giant egg is quite convenient, as it is located close to Wilson Lake on the border of Russell County and Lincoln County. an attraction home to a variety of popular hiking trails, swimming beaches, boat ramps and camping facilities.

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100 Egg Theme Park in Vietnam

Vietnam has found a way to combine relaxation and wellness with the humble egg, with tourists flocking to the 100 Egg Theme Park each year to enjoy its unique mud bath facilities. This sprawling attraction has special egg baths located sporadically throughout a beautifully landscaped nature reserve, where warm purifying mud is piped into the egg-shaped huts so that people can chill out and absorb the area in pristine privacy. The park, located in the tourist coastal city hub of Nha Trang, is also home to a myriad of pools, fountains and nature walks, so be prepared to crack your stressed shell and rest over easy.

Pysanka Museum in Ukraine

Among the countless admirers of the decorated Easter Eggs of the Ukraine known as pysanka, we are willing to wager very few have ever envisioned stepping foot inside one. But that's exactly what visitors can do at the Pysanka Museum in Kolomyia, with the central structure taking the form of a massive easter egg which houses more than 10,000 pysankas. The attractively designed eggs are typically decorated with traditional Ukrainian folk designs such as polka dots, stripes, flowers, and fruit motifs, using a wax-resist method. In August 2007, the museum was officially recognised as a landmark of modern Ukraine, and over time has become home to decorated eggs from other countries as well, such as Belarus, Poland, Romania and the United States.

The Faberge Museum in Russia

A highlight of this St Petersburg museum's amazing collection of lost Russian valuables is the nine Imperial Easter eggs created by jewellery firm House of Faberge, specifically for the last two Russian Tsars. Part of a highly exclusive collection, with most historians believing only 69 were made, the uniquely crafted, jewel-encrusted eggs were originally gifted to Russian Tsars Alexander III and Nicholas II as Easter gifts for their wives and mothers, created under the personal supervision of famed Russian jeweller Peter Carl Fabergé – sure beats a Cadbury Crème egg! The museum also houses famous artworks, as well as monuments of silver, bronze and porcelain.

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Four things

Egg-cellent easter traditions from around the world.



Cyprus

Cyprus enjoys an egg hunt as much as the next country, but do you know what else Cyprus likes? Lighting fires - especially in school- or church-yards. The fires are made up of scrap wood, typically gathered by young boys, who scour their neighbourhoods for it. Sooner or later, the police or fire department is called, to rein in boys fighting over scraps of wood, or to put out an uncontrollable fire. Just in case this didn't sound like enough fun, it is also customary for a small doll representing Judas Iscariot to be burnt

Hungary

The day following Easter, or Locsolo Hetfo, is where it's at in Hungary. The day, also known in English as 'Watering Monday', will see men visit families with girls and women to sprinkle on them water, perfume, or a combination of them both, in exchange for an Easter egg. Because a Paschal egg is rarely enough to fill up a Hungarian, families will also consume Easter ham; coloured, boiled eggs; and horseradish sauce on Easter Sunday morning, as well as the Pascha speciality sargaturo, literally "yellow curd cheese".






Florence

The unique custom of the Scoppio del carro, or "explosion of the cart", is observed on Easter Sunday. The event sees the nine-metre-tall cart, which has been used for more than 500 years, packed full of fireworks and other pyrotechnics, before it is moved from the Porta al Prato to the Piazza del Duomo by a team of white oxen, supported by 150 soldiers and musicians in 15th century dress. Meanwhile, a fire is struck using the historic flints from Jerusalem at Chiesa dei Santi Apostoli, which is then carried in procession to the cathedral square by clerics, city officials, and members of the noble Florentine Pazzi family, before it is lit. Did we mention the cart is fitted with a mechanical dove?

Bermuda

Despite its tiny size, Bermuda has enough Easter tradition for any nation. Historically famous for growing and exporting the Easter lily, perhaps the most notable tradition on Resurrection Sunday is the flying of kites to symbolise Jesus' ascent; although, these are not any kites. Bermuda kites are instead made using traditional geometric designs, are noted for their colour. The practice is an art form as much as a recreational tool and are constructed by kids from flat sticks arrayed like spokes of a wheel, with a nail at the axis. Oh, in addition to hot cross buns and Easter eggs, they also eat fish cakes.



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Easter Island is an intriguing destination and one visited by few cruise ships, due to the lack of harbour and often problematic weather. Most ships that bring visitors to the island transfer them by tender and only around 30% of the ships manage to successfully visit.

The island is one of the most isolated in the world and is located 2,300km west of Chile's coast. For those that are lucky enough to make it to the island, there is a fascinating history to explore, which is as interesting as it is mysterious. The local people, Rapa Nui, have been isolated from the rest of the world and developed a distinctive culture. But when they arrived on the island and why their civilisation eventually collapsed are unclear.

One of the most distinctive features of Easter Island is the huge moai statues, carved from volcanic stone and on average 4m tall and weighing 14 tonnes, which were moved to specific places around the island.

MSC Cruises' 2022 World Cruise will take travellers to 43 destinations across 117 days. Easter Island is just one of these exciting stops. The ship is scheduled to make a call on one day, so it is more likely that guests may just experience a scenic pass of the island, perfect to break up the long sea days sailing across the Pacific.

Pacific Gems and Australia's Coral Coast **Seabourn Cruise Line**

Departing 6 Jan 2023

If you want to immerse yourself in some of the highlights of the Pacific over 80 days, this Seabourn cruise is perfect for you. The cruise starts in Miami before sailing the Panama Canal and then down the coast of South America. The call to Easter Island is an overnight one, which means more opportunities to explore the island and five different shore excursions travellers can choose from.


Icon under a microscope




